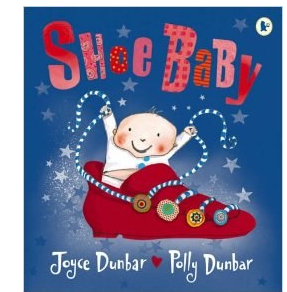
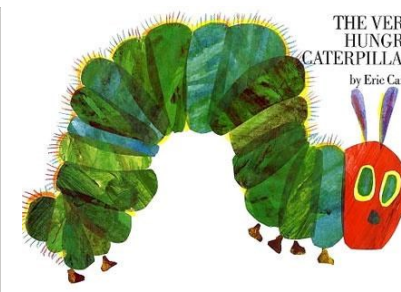
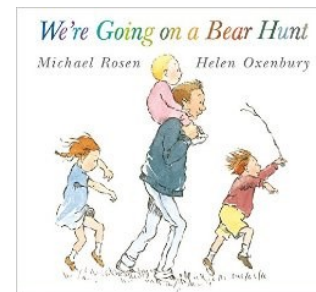
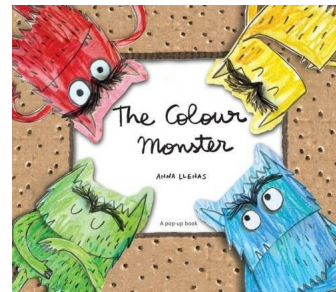
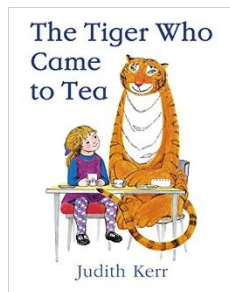
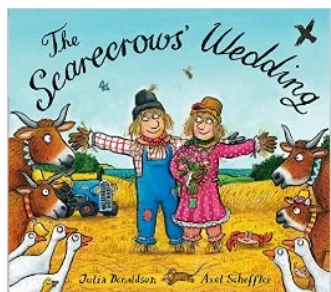
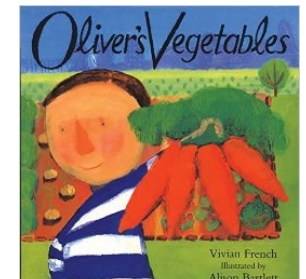
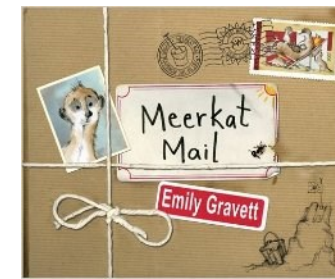
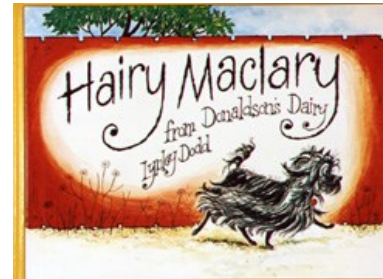
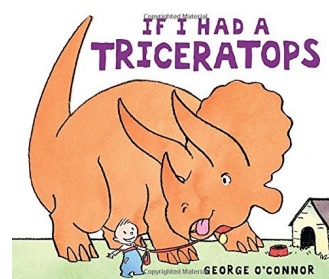
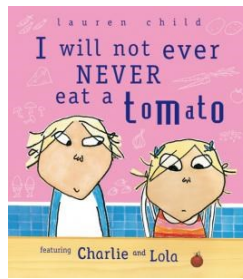
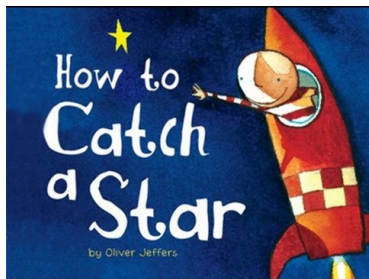
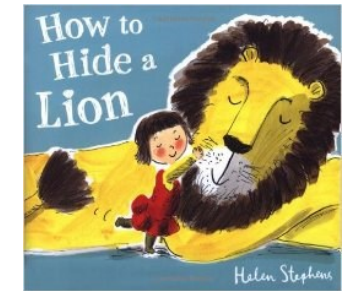
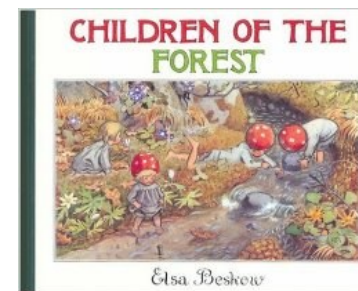
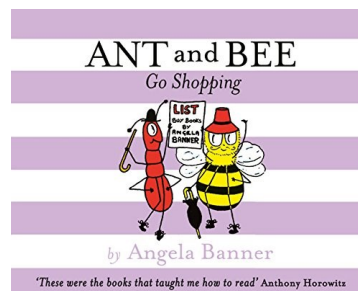
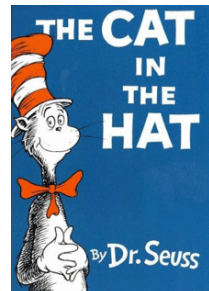
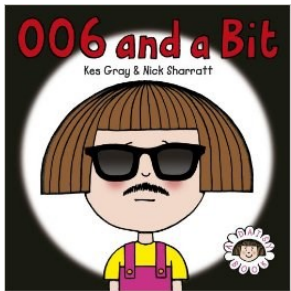


Year One Recommended Reading
