

What Are Sharks?

Sharks are fish. They live in the water but, unlike other fish, their skeletons are made of cartilage. This means that they can swim quicker and easier because it allows them to be more flexible. Cartilage is a tough, rubbery material found also in rays and skates.

Going Back in Time...

There are more than 350 varieties of shark: from the enormous whale shark, which can grow as large as a bus, to the terrifying great white shark, known for eating large mammals with its huge, jagged teeth. Fossils indicate that sharks have been around for more than 420 million years.




Terrifying Teeth

Sharks' teeth are their weapons. They are constantly replaced throughout their lives. This is good news because they often eat violently and can break teeth whilst doing so. New teeth reside in a groove just inside their mouths and move forward – like conveyor belts – in the shark's skin. A shark's teeth vary depending on the shark species: different sharks need teeth suited to the prey that they catch. For example, a hornshark has small, cone-shaped teeth for cracking and grinding shells. In its lifetime a shark can need up to 30,000 teeth. As a result, many people enjoy collecting different types of shark teeth.

Name: Telling the Time Telling the Time

Skeleton Cut Out and Label



With the help of an adult have a go at one (or both!) of these delicious no bake recipes at home.



120 g butter
2 cups caster sugar
2 tbs cocoa (sitted)
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup Nutella (Or any
other chocolate spread)
1 tbs vanilla extract
21/2 cups rolled oats
21/2 cups Rice crispies
sprinkles

- Line a backing tray with baking paper and set aside.
- With an adults help: in a large saucepan melt the butter then add sugar, cocoa and milk. Whisk together and bring to the boil. Boil for one minute. Remove from heat.
- Add the Nutella, vanilla, rolled oats and rice crispies to the pan and combine well.
- Pour into slice pan and smooth flat with the back of a metal spoon. Scatter over your choice of sprinkles. (I used coated chocolate chips.)
- Refrigerate until set. This will take about 3 hours. Cut into squares with a sharp knife.

15 digestive biscuits 15 marshmallows 15 glacé cherries, cut in half about 200ml condensed milk 100g desiccated coconut, to coat

- Crush the digestive biscuits in a food processor or in a plastic bag with a rolling pin, then put them in a large mixing bowl.
- Chop each marshmallow into 4 pieces and add to the bowl with the cherries and 175ml condensed milk. Mix until the ingredients are well combined and you have a sticky mixture. If it's too dry, add a splash more condensed milk.
- Sprinkle most of the coconut over a large piece of cling film (or foil). Tip the mixture onto the coconut and shape into a long sausage, about 30 x 5cm.
- Sprinkle more coconut over the top of it and wrap the cling film tightly around, twisting the ends together.
- Leave in the fridge to chill for 4-6 hrs, then cut into 15 slices and serve. Will keep in the fridge for up to 1 week wrapped in cling film.

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Make an Animal Page Corner Bookmark

You will need:

- · bookmark template
- glue
- scissors

Make an animal page corner bookmark and never lose your place in a book again.



Neatly, cut round the edge of the square template.



Fold the paper in half, using fold line one, to make a triangle – you should be able to see the animal's face once you've done this.



Turn the triangle over to the side showing fold lines two, three and four. The top corner should be pointing away from you.





Fold along fold line two, matching up the corners, so that you can see one half of the animal's face. Repeat with fold line three so you can now see the whole face.




Unfold these two halves of the face to show fold lines two, three and four again. Using fold line four, fold the top corner of the paper down (top layer of paper only) so it touches the bottom edge of the paper.

Frog Template







Cat Template







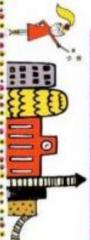
