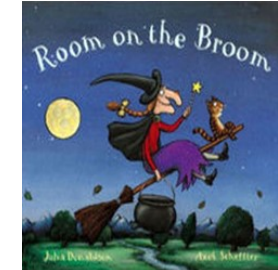
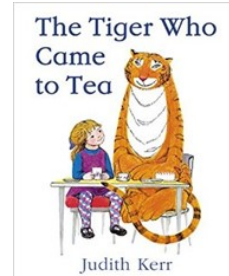
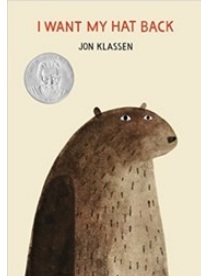
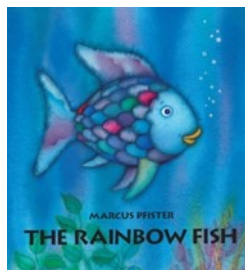
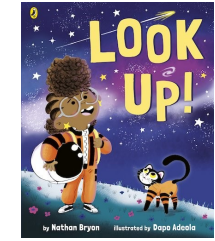
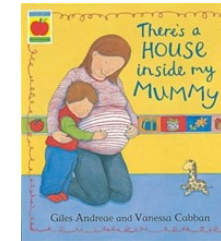
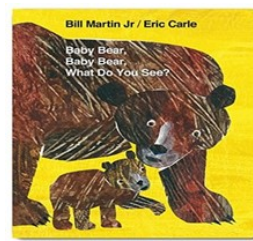
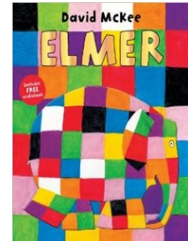
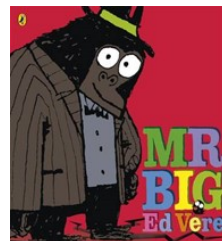
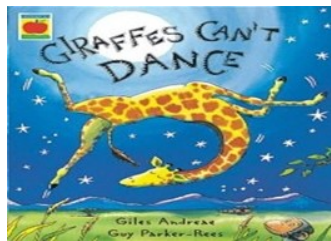
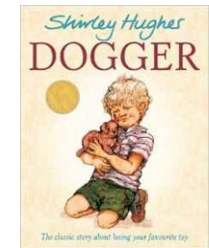
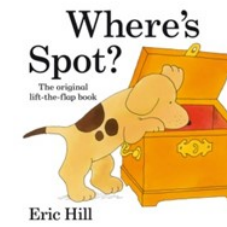
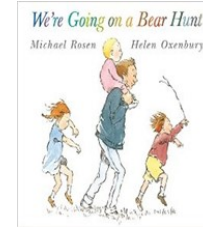
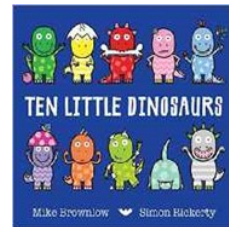
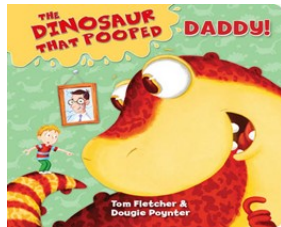


# Foundation Stage Recommended Reading - Fiction
